## Speakers

Bradley T. Erford, Ph.D.

Bradley T. Erford, Ph.D., is a Professor in the School Counseling Program at Loyola College in MD. He is a much in demand lecturer, speaker, and consultant. Erford is the recipient of the American Counseling Association (ACA) Research Award, Professional Development Award, and Carl D. Perkins Government Relations Award. He was also inducted as an ACA Fellow. In addition, he has received professional and service awards from a variety of organizations and groups. His research specialization falls primarily in development and technical analysis of psycho-educational tests and has resulted in the publication of six texts, numerous refereed journal articles, book chapters, and published tests.

He has held numerous leadership positions in the state, regional and national counseling associations. He is Past President of AACE and Past Chair and current Parliamentarian of the American Counseling Association - Southern (US) Region.

Dr. Erford has been a faculty member at Loyola since 1993 and is a Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor, Licensed Professional Counselor, Nationally Certified Counselor, Licensed Psychologist and Licensed School Psychologist. Prior to arriving at Loyola, Dr. Erford was a school psychologist/counselor in the Chesterfield County (VA) Public Schools. He maintains a private practice specializing in assessment and treatment of children and adolescents. A graduate of The University of Virginia, he teaches courses in a number of counseling areas.

Dr. Tonea Stewart

One of last year's speakers, Tonea Stewart is coming back by popular demand. Stewart, a native of Greenwood, Mississippi, has lived in Montgomery, AL since 1990. She is a tenured Professor and Director of Theatre Arts at Alabama State University. She is also a professional actress. She holds BS, MA and PhD degrees. Tonea is a spokesperson for "One Church, One Child" of Alabama and for NOSAP, a Texas based organization aimed at youth development.

As Director of Theatre, Tonea serves as teacher, role model, and mentor to many students at ASU. Since her arrival, the number of Theatre majors and minors and the number of graduates from the program has more than doubled. Youth from the Montgomery area and across the nation have been touched by her work.

As an actress, Tonea is perhaps best known for her role in *The Heat of the Night*. More recently, she earned an NAACP Image Award nomination for her role in the film adaptation of John Grisham's *A Time to Kill*. She has performed on stage throughout the United States, including Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center. Internationally, she has performed in Canada, Mexico, and South Korea, and appeared on screen and television. Some notable titles include: "Mississippi Burning," "Invasion of the Body Snatchers III," "Living Large," "My Stepson/My Lover," "Walker, Texas Ranger," "Matlock," "Leave of Absence," and "I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings."

Marilyn Van Derbur

After being crowned Miss America, Marilyn returned to the University of Colorado and graduated with Phi Beta Kappa honors. After graduation, she moved to New York City where she was the television spokeswoman for AT&T. She also hosted *The Bell Telephone Hour* and hosted ten shows of *Candid Camera*. She also hosted *The Cotton Bowl Parade*, the *Thanksgiving Day Parade*, and the opening of the World's Fair. In addition, she was the television hostess for *The Miss America Pageant* for five years. She is currently active in public speaking.

Marilyn Van Derbur was a victim of incest and sexual abuse. Since going public many years ago with the story of her past, Marilyn has made it her mission to shed light on the raw truth of sexual abuse in all its forms. She is the author of Miss America By Day: Lessons Learned from Ultimate Betrayals and Unconditional Love. This book is the culmination of her life's work.

Jerri Lynn Morrow

Jerri Lynn is the current President of the Alabama Counseling Association. She is a professional high school counselor in the Jefferson County School System at Pleasant Grove High School. She began her teaching career as an English teacher and a choral music director at Dora High School in the Walker County School System. Both her undergraduate and graduate degrees were earned from the University of Montevallo. She has also taken several counseling courses from the University of Alabama in Birmingham.

Professionally, Jerri Lynn has held various offices with Chapter IV and the Alabama School Counselor Association as well as other offices with the Alabama School Counseling Association. As a Jefferson County Board of Education employee, she serves on several committees such as the Curriculum Steering Committee and the Counseling Steering Committee.

Away from school Jerri Lynn enjoys music, reading, and traveling. Even when she is not traveling she enjoys looking on the internet and planning to travel. Most of all she enjoys being with family and friends both in and out of the counseling profession.

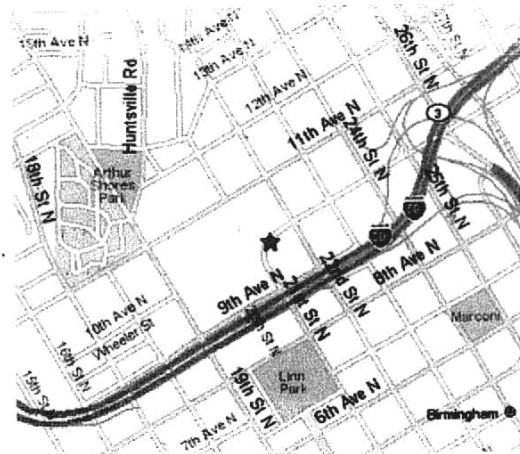
