

# meet our speakers





Dr. Edil Torres Rivera is a professor and Director of the Latinx Studies at Wichita State University, Kansas. He is interested in multicultural counseling, group work, chaos theory, liberation psychology, technology, supervision, multicultural counseling, prisons, Puerto Rican studies, identity development, and gang-related behavior. Specifically, his primary research focuses on complexity and how indigenous healing techniques are a necessary

ingredient when working with ethnic minority populations in the United States. His work has appeared multiple journals and he serves on several editorial boards.

Since 1995, Dr. Torres has presented papers at national and international conferences such as the American Psychological Association (APA), American Counseling Association (ACA), the Association for Counseling Education and Supervision (ACES), the Association for Specialists in Group Work (ASGW), National Latinx Psychology Association (NLPA), the American Educational Research Association (AERA), and the Interamerican Society of Psychology (SIP). His invited presentations include workshops in North Carolina, Washington, and New Hampshire. He is the recipient of the Best Group Research Article of the Year (March 2000), the National Defense Service Medal (February 1990), the Army Commendation Medal (November 1986), the Army Achievement Medal First Oak Leaf (August 1986), a fellow at the American Counseling Association as well as the Specialists for Group Work, and the Ohana Award for social justice (March 2004).

Additionally, I am a 1990 graduate of Vanderbilt Law School and have been a licensed attorney for over 26 years. I am a 2016 graduate of Auburn University with a PHD in Rehabilitation, Counseling, and Leadership.

My Hobbies - I enjoy woodworking, scuba diving, and vegetable gardening, among other activities.

# alca pre-conference

The ALCA Pre-Conference will take place on Tuesday, November 14, 2023 at the BJCC, Forum B from 9:00 am to 4:30 pm and continue on Friday, November 17, 2023 in the same location and time frame.

About DC: 0-5 Clinical Training:

Clinical DC: 0 - 5T training is designed to support mental health professionals in developing indepth knowledge of the approach and content of DC:0-5T, understanding the multi-axial system, and utilizing the approach and system in their work with children birth through age five.

Participants will be supported in understanding the need for and development of a specialized diagnostic classification system for infancy and early childhood and adopting approaches to diagnosis and assessment that are developmentally informed, relationship based, and contextually and culturally grounded.

Participants will learn about the multi-axial approach to diagnosis as well understanding the contents of each axis including Axis I clinical disorders. Activities and case-based learning will support participants in using the many tools included in DC:0-5T.

Mental health professionals who are responsible for clinical diagnosis and are contracted to provide mental health services to children birth through age five enrolled in Apple Health (either with or without managed care).
